

Finally, the class will work together to mitigate mass casualty incidents (MCl's) secondary to acts of violence. This course is limited to 24 registrants. Mock Trial: Walt Payton v. Aaron Jordan and Sandberg County EMS • 0800-1200 – (EMS General) – 4 CEs

This mock trial will introduce participants and the audience to the intersection between trial law and pre-hospital emergency medicine. In this fictional case, Walt Payton-a seventeen year old-was injured while diving off his friend's shoulders into shallow water. Paramedic Aaron Jordan, of Sandberg County EMS, responded to the call and provided aid to Mr. Payton. The issue will be whether Mr. Jordan was negligent (and if so, to what degree) when he failed to take cervical spine precautions. The audience will hear testimony and argument from attorneys and witnesses from both sides of the case. Finally, the audience will have an opportunity to ask questions of the witnesses and will act as the jury, ultimately deciding whether Mr. Jordan and Sandberg County EMS are liable for Mr. Payton's injuries.
