Basic Search & Rescue • 0800-1200 OR 1300-1700 (Fire) – 4 Hrs Chief Tony Davis, FI; Capt. Lyn Nofziger, FI
This course reviews basic search and rescue techniques through a series of dynamic training evolutions. The Ohio Fire Academy will provide the instructors and the Mobile Search & Rescue Training Lab for this training at your location. The unique design is a combination of a residential dwelling and a confidence maze that offers a quality learning experience for firefighters with limited experience to your more seasoned veteran. **This course is limited to 20 registrants. Registrants are required to bring their own full PPE if they would like to go through the trailer. Fire CE's provided by the OFA.**

EMS Readiness for Austere Environment Operations • 0800-1700 (EMSTrauma) – 8 CEs
Mike Stinson, Chuck Brooks, EMT-T; Chris Hudspeth, EMT-T; Nadi Graham, EMT-T
Through case study review, as well as performing various life saving interventions used in Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) environments, EMS Readiness for Austere Environment Operations will allow Healthcare workers to better understand and support elite police units missions. Finally, the class will work together to mitigate mass casualty incidents (MCI's) secondary to acts of violence. **This course is limited to 24 registrants. Registrants must be physically able to perform scenarios.**

Fire investigation is an important part of the services provided to the public through our prevention activities. In this workshop, you will see case studies and note some differences between the public and private side of fire investigations.

Mock Trial: Walt Payton v. Aaron Jordan and Sandberg County EMS • 0800-1200 – (EMS General) – 4 CEs
Tom Anger, EMT-B, JD
This mock trial will introduce participants and the audience to the intersection between trial law and pre-hospital emergency medicine. In this fictional case, Walt Payton-a seventeen year old-was injured while diving off his friend's shoulders into shallow water. Paramedic Aaron Jordan, of Sandberg County EMS, responded to the call and provided aid to Mr. Payton. The issue will be whether Mr. Jordan was negligent (and if so, to what degree) when he failed to take cervical spine precautions. The audience will hear testimony and argument from attorneys and witnesses from both sides of the case. Finally, the audience will have an opportunity to ask questions of the witnesses and will act as the jury, ultimately deciding whether Mr. Jordan and Sandberg County EMS are liable for Mr. Payton's injuries.

By 2030, over 20% of the US population will be over the age of 65. These patients account for nearly 30-40% of EMS Transports and this rate is growing. This lecture will focus on special considerations related to the care of this patient population in the pre-hospital environment, in both traumatic and medical situations.

During an acute ischemic stroke, time is brain. While alteplase has been shown to be an effective treatment, US hospitals frequently fail to meet the target time frame to optimize its effectiveness.
